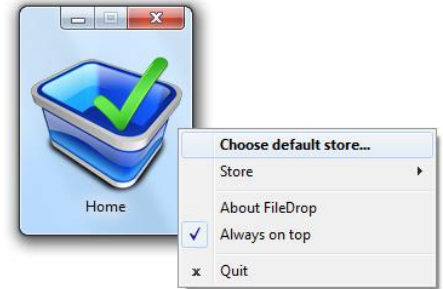
Case Study: Family Vacation

► The situation

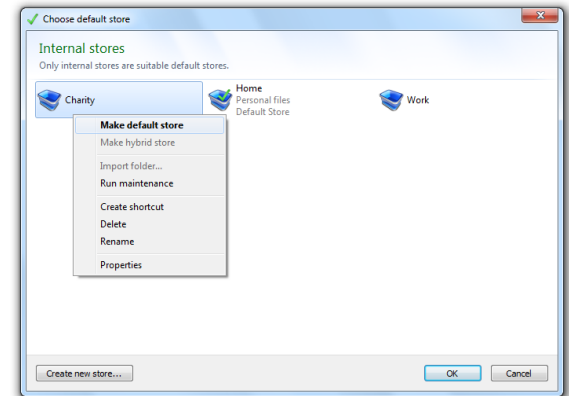
Pierre and his family love to travel in their tight spare time and they record always a lot of memories on the way.

► Our recipe for success

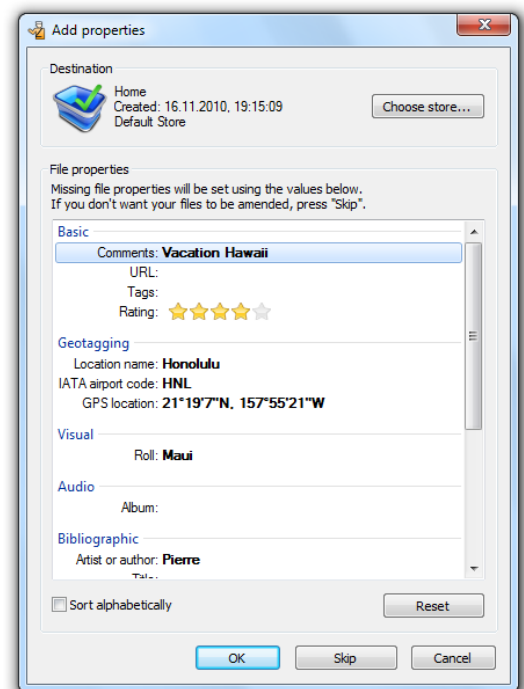
Whenever Pierre uses liquidFOLDERS' FileDrop, he saves a lot of his valuable time:



Using Drag&Drop, he drags all new files on the FileDrop window. These files are imported into the default store:



Using this window, Pierre can assign additional information to all the files:



This gives Pierre more time for the things that really matter to him: his family.

Why don't **you** use liquidFOLDERS to find your files?

► The challenge

At home, or even already during the trip, the time comes when Pierre has to sort and categorize the collected pictures and videos.

Therefore, Pierre must provide tags and additional information for his pictures and videos, so that he can quickly retrieve them later on. Right now, Pierre can only do this by carefully assigning file and folder names.

By the fact that Pierre is completely occupied by his profession and his family, he doesn't really want to spend time on sorting his files. Who does, anyway? So Pierre simply copies all the photos and videos from his camera to the same subdirectory, often without even renaming them—let alone tagging.

This is the same as in the good old days, when most people simply stored their pictures in big shoe boxes.

But this makes it incredibly difficult and bothersome to retrieve the pictures and videos—which defeats the purpose of memories alltogether.
